# Introduction



n 2006 the Bambisanani Partnership emerged from a British Council/Youth Sport Trust initiative linking UK and South African Schools through physical education and sport. The link between St. Mary's High School in Leeds and Mnyakanya High School, which serves one of KwaZulu-Natal's most deprived rural communities, went on to become embedded in the lives of both schools, inspiring young people in many areas of the curriculum through joint learning activities.

Bambisanani is a Zulu word meaning 'working hand in hand' and aptly describes the work and vision of this inspirational partnership that uses sport as a catalyst to promote education, health, global citizenship and leadership.

Now a multi-award winning charity, the pioneering partnership has gained international acclaim for its work. Despite the most challenging of circumstances this project has not only been sustained it has grown and expanded to involve other schools and indeed universities.

Significantly, the University of Leeds and Leeds Trinity University are now both heavily involved in the partnership and like St. Mary's School regularly have students out in South Africa to extend and develop the partnerships various programmes, including 'Leadership Through Sport', 'Literacy Through Sport' and 'Cycling To Success'.

A fundamental aim of the partnership has been to create genuine 'two way' learning between both countries with a key focus on 'working together and learning together'. The Bambisanani story is testimony of the power of sport to change lives and has served as a reminder to many just why they became a teacher.


Four highly acclaimed Bambisanani books have been published, the last in 2016. This booklet provides a selection of published articles, reports and news stories from 2016 - 2020.

### Bambisanani Partnership also Celebrates its Tenth Anniversary

n 2006, as the then Director of PE and Sport at St Marys RC Sports College in Leeds, I visited South Africa as part of the British Council/Youth Sport Trust Dreams and Teams initiative. Ten years on, and as a direct result of that initial visit, I now have the privilege of leading the multi-award winning Bambisanani Partnership charity. The partnership has gained international acclaim for its work developing value-driven sport for its own sake but also, and significantly, for using sport as a catalyst to promote education, health, global citizenship, enterprise and leadership in one of South Africa's poorest regions.

From an initial meeting between two schools from very different parts of the world – St Mary's in Leeds and Mnyakanya School in rural KwaZulu Natal – the Bambisanani Partnership emerged and has grown into an exceptional international collaboration based on mutual respect and shared outcomes: "Two school communities working together and learning

together". The Zulu word 'Bambisanani' literally means 'working hand in hand' and is a fitting name for the partnership. Very few international school links are sustained for as long or have the impact that the Bambisanani Partnership has had. I believe that this in down to the two school communities making an absolute and genuine commitment to global learning and to each other: "The Bambisanani Partnership is not just embedded in both schools' communities it is part of our DNA now, part of who we are and what we believe in. This work is a constant reminder of our values, our purpose and the importance of interdependence."

Annual exchange visits of teachers and students have had a most profound effect on all those involved.

A key feature of the Bambisanani Partnership is the fact that, throughout the year, a range of learning activities take place to involve as many curriculum areas and students as possible. This is a major reason for the success of the programme.

Very few curriculum areas in either school have not harnessed the enormous interest in the Bambisanani Partnership as a catalyst for learning. Beyond PE and sport some remarkable work has also taken place in humanities, religious education, English, science, music and art. Students also have the opportunity to be involved in the Bambisanani Enterprise Programme (a student-led business to support the work of the partnership), the Bambisanani Award Programme and the Bambisanani Leadership Programme. Whilst not everyone

is able to go on the annual visit, everyone can be involved in something, whether they are a student or member of staff.

Last year I left my beloved St Mary's School to establish and lead the Bambisanani Partnership as a registered charity. This will enable us to make an even greater impact, as our supporters recognise.

It is wonderful news that the Bambisanani Partnership has become a registered charity. For the past ten years staff and students at St Mary's and Mnyakanya have worked tirelessly to create an amazing partnership that has used the power of sport to promote wider educational goals in a genuine international collaboration. Becoming a charity demonstrates the commitment of both schools to global learning which will now lead to further opportunities to involve more schools and young people in both countries in this inspirational work.

In its tenth anniversary year the Bambisanani Partnership has ambitious plans to extend its work and influence. In addition to the annual exchanges and the provision of a wide range of new learning activities in both schools, the charity is working with the University of Leeds to develop leadership programmes with its own students and to develop a unique cycling programme in KwaZulu Natal. At Mnyakanya School it is currently working with Intel and the KZN Department of Education to pioneer the installation of Wi-Fi and computers to enhance learning in remote rural schools. The partnership's long-term relationship with Zulufadder Orphanage will be developed through the building of a new hostel for vulnerable children. As Chair of the charity, I have also been invited by the South African High Commission to the UK to help establish a sport and education forum linking the UK and South Africa.

To celebrate and promote its work, the Bambisanani Partnership has published three remarkable books over the last nine years. To celebrate this tenth anniversary, we intend to complete a fourth: Bambisanani: Ten Years of Working Together. We hope other schools will look forward to this and be inspired to establish their own international partnerships.



he Bambisanani Partnership has gained international acclaim for its pioneering work using sport as a catalyst to promote education, health, global citizenship and leadership in one of South Africa's most deprived areas. Based on extracts from the recently published book Bambisanani: Ten years of Working together and Learning Together, twelve key individuals involved in the work of the Bambisanani Partnership offer their perspectives on the past ten years but also on what the future might hold for the multi award winning charity.



### DARREN BEARDSLEY, HEADTEACHER, ST. MARY'S SCHOOL



When thinking about Bambisanani Partnership, it is important to consider the phrase 'Working Together, Learning Together'. These objectives are essential for a successful partnership in that we do learn so much together and that we support each other. Writing as the Headteacher of St. Mary's, Menston, I have been privileged to talk to staff and students who have benefited enormously

from working with Mnyakanya High School. The philosophy of all involved within the partnership is that it is an equitable, sustainable and effective partnership that has a positive impact on both schools, but also the wider communities. The effectiveness of a school is often measured using examination data and this is important in providing opportunities for our students, but the real success of a school is how it works to develop young people so that they go on to benefit society in the future. We take this seriously and the skills and understanding that students develop in global citizenship, global justice, enterprise and leadership, by taking part in the partnership, equips them to make the world a better place in the future.

It is important that we celebrate the success of the partnership so far, but it is also imperative that we continue to develop our work. We are planning ways in which the partnership can influence younger students at St. Mary's with the introduction of the Bambisanani Award. The students have responded incredibly positively to this and I am delighted that we have recently presented our first award in an assembly at school. The influence on University students is also being enhanced by the involvement of two of our Universities in Leeds as part of the partnership.

All of these developments are exciting for the future of this inspirational work and continue to be driven by our desire to 'Work Together and Learn Together'.

South Africa has a history of people from abroad attempting to "serve" the local community. Many of these missions flounder in time because they are designed to engender a feeling of goodwill more for the giver than the recipient. It is to the credit of the founder and his dedicated team that the Bambisanani Partnership has persisted for a decade. Bambisanani – working hand in

hand – works because there is neither a giver nor a receiver. Two groups, from different ends of the planet, each borrowing from the culture of the other forge relationships through the medium of sport, changing perspectives of both from the experience.

I believe that hands that serve are holier than hands that are folded in prayer and I have had numerous personal experiences over the past ten years of how the interaction between the two groups, compressed into a fortnight, has fostered joy and hope in a world so full of gloom and turmoil that it overshadows the innate goodness of mankind.

A sports field where once only a windswept dustbowl existed is an example of the improvements that are planned.

I consider myself a Bambisanani Partner and am delighted to have been involved with this noble project since its inception. I look forward to offering my humble help in the future in enhancing the experiences of the participants of Leeds as a small measure of thanks.

It's unbelievable that the partnership has persevered for over a decade already and is surely a testament to the dedication and passion of the partners. Whilst the partnership is not about individuals, it is most certainly the amazing passion and drive of David Geldart that has ensured that it has flourished and blossomed into something beyond the initial dreams and goals of the British

Council's/Youth Sports Trust *Dreams and Teams* initiative.

The partnership has had many material benefits which will be highlighted below but one aspect I believe is the ethos of the partnership, which is more important than just the material benefits it has provided. Firstly, it has allowed learners and teachers from both partner schools, Mnyakanya and St. Mary's to interact with each other through sport and sport related activities and given them the opportunity to develop important skills and values such as leadership, tolerance, sharing, understanding of other cultures and foster continuing links between them. Secondly, it allows for a school community in a rural part of South Africa to become a part of the global village through their regular interactions with learners and teachers from the UK thereby fostering a deeper understanding of global citizenship – skills which will be invaluable to learners from rural communities like Mnyakanya who ordinarily may not have such opportunities. The partnership has further allowed Mnyakanya learners to participate in global initiatives, notably the Diana Awards, in which learners from the school were the first South African recipients of this award again highlighting the value the partnership has provided learners from Mnyakanya to participate in international activities.

The blossoming of the partnership in the past few years has seen it move beyond just being a leadership through sports initiative but graduate to becoming one which has taken a deeper interest in developing the lives of the learners of Mnyakanya even further through the formation of the Bambisanani Charity. Through the invaluable efforts and funding by the charity in 2015 Mnyakanya was able to initially begin the first phase of an ICT rollout programme at the school which saw educational tablets being introduced to the school

and training for teachers. This has subsequently been followed by further funding from the charity which has seen the school becoming a part of the global village through the provision of a satellite Internet service at the school. The partnership has further provided uniforms to learners from disadvantaged homes, sports equipment to the school and bursaries to a few learners to pursue university study.

The partnership has also managed to gain the interest of other stakeholders like the University of Leeds which has provided the school with mountain bikes for use by learners who would normally walk great distances to school. Other stakeholders have also shown interest in developing a football pitch to further change the lives of the Mnyakanya learners and the surrounding community.

The fledgling *Dreams and Teams* initiative has developed wings and may the Bambisanani Partnership soar to greater heights and give the learners and teachers from both schools, through their regular interactions, the opportunity to continue learning about the value and importance of global citizenship. To quote the founding father of our democratic state, Nelson Mandela:

'Education is the great engine of personal development. It is through education that the daughter of a peasant can become a doctor, that the son of a mineworker can become the head of the mine, that a child of farm workers can become the president of a great nation.'

It is my belief that the partnership and the assistance it provides to the community of Mnyakanya can allow for a lot more daughters and sons of peasants to take their rightful places in life and free their communities from the painful burden of poverty.



I think the impact of the Bambisanani Partnership has three levels; the personal, the educational and the spiritual.

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



### Volunteering work in South Africa reaches new heights

Based in Leeds, UK, the Bambisanani

This summer has seen the multi-award
winning charity take on its most ambitious
volunteering project in its twelve year history.
Students and staff from St. Mary's School,
Menston, the University of Leeds and Leeds
Trinity University have recently returned from
South Africa where both individually and
collaboratively they extended and developed
the work of the partnership.

Following eighteen months of preparation, planning and fundraising, sixteen students from St. Mary's embarked on a mission to deliver a 'Leadership Through Sport' programme' to students at Mnyakanya High School situated in the remote, rural Nkandla area. This year's visit was led by Catherine Chattoe with support from Brad Dobson and Charlotte Wood.

The student team included Olivia Brady, Joe Gardner, Grace Darker, Orla Turnbull, Lily Humphreys, Libby Woffenden, Charlotte Walker, Rhiannon Boardman, Nicholas Brinkworth, Sylvia Cullen, Edward Fieldhouse, Aidan Joyce, Luke Barnes, Maeve Hendron, Lucy Hings and Lily Greenhalgh.

Throughout their visit St. Mary's students were assisted by three students from Eshowe High School; Morgan Gray, Nokabongwa Mtembu and Sbongisiwe Ntuli who supported them with the delivery of the leadership programme and provided valuable assistance with English and Zulu language translation.



After four intense days of hockey, netball and rounders coaching, thirty Mnyakanya students were fully equipped and confident enough to organise and host a spectacular Sports and Reading Festival for over 120 children from Ntolwane Primary School. The success of the collaboration between the students from both countries was celebrated with a special presentation ceremony. South African students received leadership awards and annual awards as a way of recognising and celebrating their ability and potential as outstanding leaders.

Additionally as part of the visit, the St. Mary's students delivered lessons in a wide range of curriculum areas. Enthusiastic staff and students from Mnyakanya High School experienced high quality lessons in English, Maths, Geography, Science, Music and Drama. In one lesson Mnyakanya students represented the components of the solar system and moved around the playground as a way of learning how the solar system works.

The final part of their visit saw the St. Mary's students volunteering at uMlalazi Day Centre and Crèche, a centre for AIDS orphans and vulnerable children run by the Zulufadder Children's Trust. This was a magical time for the St. Mary's students where they loved bringing stories to life with the use of props and toys and, for the first time, helped with the centre's gardening project by planting some vegetables.

Members of staff Tilly Hall, Tom Exeter and Lisa Naylor led this year's visit of ten students representing a wide range of degree programmes. Natalie Donohue, Emma Sallis, Georgina Ellis, Charlie Vickers, Ava Martinez-Lambert, Francisca Darko, Aimee Christadoulou, Jessica Hole, Rachael Dickinson and Emily Bowden made up the 'Gryphons Abroad' team that successfully delivered two major projects over the two week period: Cycling for Success and Inspire through Sport and Leadership.

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Both of these projects were also supported by three students from Leeds Trinity University, namely Oorjitha Prem, Danielle Lawrance and Katherine Skelton.



The Cycling for Success programme was based at Mnyakanya High School where the team taught a group of thirty students how to ride and maintain bikes.



Student Francisca Darko:

The Cycle for Success week of the trip has been amazing. To see students who had never been on a bike cycle by themselves and know how to fix them when something went wrong after only three days of teaching is pretty unbelievable!"

By the end of the week all students could ride a bike, most of whom had never been on a bike before and nine students had all the skills and knowledge of road signalling to cycle on the main road. The skills the students have learnt are invaluable and many of them have already used the bikes to get to and from school, which for some was previously a two hour walk each way.

The South Africa school teachers also spoke about the impact of the project on the students' motivation, confidence and desire to succeed, and how the bikes were being used in the community.



Mrs Pk Zondi from Mnyakanya School:

It's not only the school that is benefiting from these bikes, it's also the community. Learners who have learnt these skills are now showing others how to do it at the weekend. They learn a lot doing this project, they become motivated and go on to be something outside of the community."



The second week of the visit saw the students from the two Leeds Universities lead the Inspire through Sport and Leadership programme to over 160 primary school children from the town of Eshowe. Through a range of sporting activities and challenges, the primary students learnt a range of leadership skills based on communication, organisation and planning. This work culminated in the children themselves taking responsibility for leading sports sessions.

The Gryphons Abroad team also led a classroom sessions based around their degrees, where subjects as diverse as Maths and Mental Health were taught.

In the Bambisanani spirit of 'Working Together and Learning Together' the University of Leeds team made a major contribution to this year's programme by supporting staff and students from Leeds Trinity University who were making their first student visit to South Africa as part of the Bambisanani Partnership.

Led by members of staff Dr Chirs Rowley and Dr Nicola Arjomandkhah, seven students from Leeds Trinity University (LTU) travelled to KwaZulu-Natal, as part of the university's landmark inaugural International Volunteering visit to the region as part of the Bambisanani Partnership. Oorjitha Prem, Danielle Lawrance and Katherine Skelton accompanied the Gryphons Abroad team in the delivery of the aforementioned Cycling for Success and Inspire through Sport and Leadership projects. This first collaboration of its kind between students and staff from the two universities was a great success, representing an exciting avenue for future combined work in the region.

Alongside these projects, four LTU Primary Education students spent their time in two South African schools as part of their 'alternative teaching placement' module. Amy James, Beth Ward, Hannah Page and Harriet Mackinney joined the university travelling party, with a view to extending the successful work of the Bambisanani Partnership into some of the Primary Schools within the KwaZulu-Natal region. Week one saw the students work across grades four to seven in Ntolwane Primary School in Nkandla, with class sizes averaging around 70 to 100 pupils. A range of subject areas were covered, including Geography, Maths, Physical Education and English, with the 'Premier Skills' resources (developed by the British Council in partnership with the Premier League) proving to be particularly useful in facilitating the delivery of English language lessons to Zulu natives. In week two the students were then allocated a specific grade to teach at John Wesley Primary School in Eshowe, presenting an opportunity to work alongside local teaching staff, and to learn more about the country's education system and culture.

All of the LTU students involved in the project received academic credit towards their respective programmes of study, and stressed the personal and professional gains they had achieved throughout the two weeks. Harriet Mackinney said that she felt "privileged to share the ethos of the Bambisanani Partnership" with the primary school pupils she had worked with, and Oorjitha Prem poignantly suggested that the visit had been "an amazing learning experience for both parties, more so for us, in my opinion."

To see students who had never been on a bike cycle by themselves and know how to fix them when something went wrong after only three days of teaching is pretty unbelievable!"

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from Mnyakanya School commented: "It's not only the school that is benefiting from these bikes, it's also the community. Learners who have learnt these skills are now showing others how to do it at the weekend. They learn a lot doing this project, they become motivated and go on to be something outside of the community."

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challenges, the primary students learnt a range of leadership skills based on communication, organisation and planning. This work culminated in the children taking responsibility for leading sports sessions.

The Gryphons Abroad team also led classroom sessions based around their degrees, where subjects as diverse as maths and mental health were taught.

In the Bambisanani spirit of 'Working Together and Learning Together', the University of Leeds team made a major contribution to this year's programme by

supporting staff and students from Leeds Trinity University who were making their first student visit to South Africa as part of the Bambisanani Partnership. Seven students travelled to KwaZulu-Natal, as part of the university's landmark inaugural international volunteering visit to the region as part of the Bambisanani Partnership. Three accompanied the Gryphons Abroad team in the delivery of the Cycling for Success and Inspire through Sport and Leadership projects. This first collaboration of its kind between students and staff from the two universities was a great success, representing an exciting avenue for future combined work in the region.

Meanwhile, alongside these projects, four primary education students from Leeds Trinity spent their time in two South African schools as part of their alternative teaching placement module. Their aim was to extend the successful work of the Bambisanani Partnership into some of the primary schools within the KwaZulu-Natal region. Week one saw the students work across grades 4-7 in Ntolwane Primary School in Nkandla, with class sizes averaging 70-100 pupils. A range of subject areas was covered, including geography, maths, physical education and English, with the Premier Skills resources (developed by the British Council in partnership with the Premier League) proving to be particularly useful in facilitating the delivery of English language lessons to Zulu natives. In week two the students were allocated a specific grade to teach at John Wesley Primary School in Eshowe, presenting an opportunity to work alongside local teaching staff, and to learn more about the country's education system and culture.



All of the Leeds Trinity students involved in the project received academic credit towards their respective programmes of study, and stressed the personal and professional gains they had achieved throughout the two weeks. Harriet Mackinney said she felt, "Privileged to share the ethos of the Bambisanani Partnership" with the primary school pupils she had worked with, and Oorjitha Prem poignantly suggested that the visit had been, "An amazing learning experience for both parties, more so for us, in my opinion."

Dr Chris Rowley, who led this first Leeds Trinity University visit, said, "I am delighted that Leeds Trinity is part of the Bambisanani Partnership. It's a fantastic partnership that shows the impact that sport and education can have on communities and individuals. For our students it is an amazing volunteering opportunity where they can make a real difference to the lives of children and young people in South Africa."

Our challenge to all those volunteering on this project was to stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before and take the partnership to a new level. The students and staff involved in this year's visits to South Africa certainly achieved that, developing and refining existing programmes and introducing new initiatives. Over 40 young people from three institutions in Leeds worked with almost 500 Zulu youngsters over the course of two weeks in the most challenging circumstances. For all those involved, their lives will have been changed in some way. These young people are an inspiration. The innovative collaborative work between St Mary's School and the two universities is incredibly positive and is now a real strength of the partnership. All the staff involved have my utmost admiration for the opportunities that they are providing for their young people; they too are an inspiration. It is wonderful to be working so closely with three organisations who are willing to 'live their vision and values' in providing these remarkable life-changing experiences. This is real education, and long may it continue.

### Bambisanani, British Council and the Premier League team up for beautiful game in South Africa that is changing lives

ow in its twelfth year the Bambisanani Partnership has gained international acclaim for its work in the rural Nkandla area of South Africa using sport as a catalyst to promote education, health, global citizenship and leadership. From the very first visit by Founder, David Geldart, it was clear that despite lack of equipment, kit or facilities, football was of enormous importance to the Zulu community. Since that time the partnership has worked hard to use this fact to develop the game itself in the area but also to use to promote other aspects of education particularly English/Literacy through football. An example of this has been using football related books to teach reading.

This year the Bambisanani Partnership became involved in the British Council and Premier League Premier Skills initiative. Premier Skills has two distinct strands of its international work: developing local football coaches and teaching English through football related resources. All the volunteers who visited South Africa from St. Mary's School, Menston, the University of Leeds and Leeds Trinity University received training from Michael Houten from the British Council in use of the resources. In South Africa members of the Mnyakanya School and

wider Nkandla community began training as football coaches with Premier League Coach Educators in courses held in Durban. Both strands of this work have proved incredibly effective and have added much to the impact of the partnership.

The Premier Skills resources were used to great effect by students at the John Wesley School in Eshowe and in Ntolwane Primary School in Nkandla.



Harriet Mackinney, Trainee Primary School teacher, from Leeds Trinity University:

Premier Skills teaches English/ Literacy through a range of football related resources eg the use of comics based on a young boy becoming a 'soccer star'. It uses language that is simple but effective and allows children who speak English as an additional language to follow along, even if they can't read the words. Even the children who were auite new to English could still say 'you should eat fruit, you should eat vegetables', and they could get that simple English. The children that were at a higher level could expand and speak for five minutes on the topic. The youngsters absolutely loved the fact that I was using a comic book because they almost didn't see it as learning. They loved that it was about soccer because they could tell me about their favourite soccer team and they could ask me about mine. Premier Skills resources for teaching English/ Literacy are excellent and can be used effectively in a variety of contexts."





**Healthy Habits** 

Members of the Nkandla community, Thulisile Zuma and Mholi Hlabisa have progressed to the second level of the Premier Skills Coaching programming where they have received training in the coach education of others.

Mholi Hlabisa:

Attending the Premier Skills workshops helped me a lot as a young coach. I learned so much about training all kinds of people regardless of their ability or disability. The focus of our training was not just improving our ability to coach football but also on developing our confidence in communication. I will be able to pass on all that I have learned to people in my community so that we can work together as a team to promote football and other sports thus helping our youth to avoid involving themselves in criminal activities. Involving our community in sporting activities will also promote healthier lifestyles. We are also hoping that the skills we are passing on will help young people gain employment."

Thulisile Zuma:

Premier Skills has helped me develop my love of sport as a person. To be part of the Premier Skills training workshops has helped me to organise football tournaments back in my community for both boys and girls so they can develop their talent in sport. Football helps our young people to forget about involving themselves in substance abuse and crime but makes them think about their bright future in sport. In Premier Skills training we learned to work with other coaches to develop our coaching skills. We also learned about Child Protection, on how to organise tournaments and how to train other coaches. This is all going to add so much to my community where there is real passion for sport. We have  $started\ now\ to\ develop\ football\ teams$ in the community."



IN 1998, as a graduate student from Senegal and studying in the United States, Amadou Gallo Fall founded SEED Project (Sports for Education and Economic Development). Doing the maths, you will soon realise that this year it is celebrating its 21st anniversary.

Fall was inspired by his own journey as a student-athlete when he was discovered by a member of the Peace Corps in the 1980s that eventually led to a basketball scholarship in the United States. After graduating from the University of the District of Columbia, Fall worked for the Senegalese Basketball Federation. mentoring players and providing opportunities for student-athletes to further their education through basketball. Fall then joined the Dallas Mavericks (NBA) and served as the Director of Player Personnel and Vice President of International Affairs while founding and overseeing SEED Project, and launching the first basketball student-athlete academy in Africa.

Fall, currently chairman of the SEED Project Board of Directors and Vice President of Development for NBA Africa in Johannesburg, South Africa, continues to impact the lives of thousands of African youth.

Their programmes are designed to inspire, empower and equip young people with the skills and virtues they need to succeed in life. The idea is to re-define the studentathlete model and develop socially conscious leaders that will continue to drive Africa forward.

SEED's aims chime with those of John Paul 2 Foundation 4 Sport. George Onyango of the Dandora Dumpsite Rehabilitation Group (DADREG) which came on board JP2F4S in 2014, was awarded National Diversity and Inclusion Award and Recognition under Diversity and Inclusion Gender Equality Champion Award in 2017 by the Daima trust. Daima Trust Ltd is a Kenyan registered company whose goal is to award peace, inclusion and equality champions who have embraced diversity as a tool of advancing their agenda.

DADREG'S aim is to rehabilitate women and children working in the dumpsite and provide them with sustainable livelihood through education, skills and capital enabling them to escape from the poverty DADREG believes that if poverty is to be reduced among the vulnerable communities, they will need to get education and gain skills and capital made available to them. Without life-skills, people and especially women will continue going to the dumpsite because they could not compete with others who have finished their education and trainings

and have access to capital.

The school serves a vast area and many students walk two hours to and from school each day. The area has many AIDS orphans Class sizes are in excess of 60 and the school has very limited resources In 2014, inspired by what David Geldart, the founder of the Partnership saw on our website 'JP2F4S', St Mary's joined JP2F4. To celebrate my 75th birthday, and as founder of the JP2F4S charity, Mnyakanya High School received £750 for their kit and library. ## Inspirational charity says 'two-way' learning is key to success

his summer saw forty five volunteers travel to one of South Africa's poorest regions to expand the work of the multiaward winning Bambisanani Partnership charity.

Students and staff from St. Mary's School, Menston, The University of Leeds and Leeds Trinity University developed existing programmes and introduced new ones based on using sport as a catalyst to promote education, health, global citizenship and leadership in rural KwaZulu-Natal. Over a four week period the volunteers taught, coached and mentored hundreds of South African students in a variety of Bambisanani programmes which included Sports Leadership courses, cycling initiatives, Sports Festivals and other curriculum areas. The partnership's commitment to 'working together and learning together' proved to have a most significant positive impact on students from both countries.

The thirteenth annual visit by St. Mary's to South Africa was led by Brad Dobson supported by Catherine Chattoe and Charlotte Wood. The St. Mary's student team were Louis Adams, Tom Allan, Harmonia Ebrahim, Charlotte Falkingham, Rachel Farmer, Lydia Giedrojt, Stephen Ginty, Ciaran Hammond, Ellie Lamb, Adam Metcalfe, Lucy Moorby, Ben Patterson, Will Sammon and Isabel Wilks had prepared for 18 months for what would be an incredible venture and significant learning experience.

Empowering students in developing leadership skills is one of the key aspects of the Bambisanani Partnership and through their ten day visit, the St. Mary's students, supported by students from Eshowe High School, mentored thirty Mnyakanya students through the Bambisanani Leadership programme. Using sport and education, the programme aimed to provide the Mnyakanya students with the necessary leadership skills and confidence to organise and deliver a Sports Festival, a Reading Festival and new to the programme, a Writing Festival, for 120 pupils from Ntolwane Primary school. As part of this process the Mnyakanya students were taught how to play, teach and organise competitions in hockey, rugby and short tennis. The leadership course was a tremendous success as was evident when the Mnyakanya students delivered three outstanding festivals. It was a learning process that empowered students from both countries and all with a real spirit of teamwork and mutual respect. The funding for all the equipment for the Sports Leadership and Festivals at Mnyakanya was provided by Manchester based international Shipping Company, Cardinal Maritime, who have been long term supporters of the partnership.



Additionally, as part of the visit, the St. Mary's students delivered lessons in a wide range of curriculum areas, ranging from science to mathematics. The lessons were full of enthusiastic Mnyakanya learners with teachers from both countries praising the students for the exceptional quality of their work

At a special partnership celebration ceremony, Mnyakanya students received their much deserved Leadership Awards. Students from Mnyakanya and Ntolwane Primary School were presented with a series of annual awards from the John Paul II Foundation for Sport and the Lawrie McCauley awards for football and writing. Ten days of intense hard work and learning culminated in the St. Mary's students volunteering at the uMlalazi Day Centre for AIDS orphans and vulnerable children run by the Zulufadder Children's Trust. Here the students organised a variety of

sports, games, singing and story sacks which all proved to be a tremendous success.

The visit had a remarkable impact on St. Mary's students.

Rachel Farmer:

Bambisanani was an amazing opportunity. It taught me a lot about myself and the people I worked alongside. It gave me a unique opportunity to experience a very different culture. I met many inspirational people in South Africa and it was a proud moment watching the Mnyakanya students teach hockey, tennis and rugby to the primary school students. As part of their respective International Volunteering programmes, The University of Leeds and Leeds Trinity University are key members of the Bambisanani Partnership with both institutions making has a most significant impact in recent years. This year the two universities worked collaboratively on aspects of the programme as well as also developing particular areas of interest and expertise.

The University of Leeds team was led by Paddy Craig together with colleagues Lisa Naylor, Suzzi Garnett and Andrew Lockwood. Students, Emily Faux, Charlie Stevenson, Sofia Ravanis, Jess McCarrick, Izzy Bull, Freya Bourne, India Greenbury, Beth Jenks represented a diverse range of university departments and courses.

The Leeds Trinity University was led by Nicola Arjomandkhah assisted by Sheila King. Students from Primary Education courses included Hannah Bewley, Mia Bogush, Georgia Gould, Phoebe Huggan, Claudia Jordan, Lauren Macarthur, Lizzy Marks and Beth Skelton with Jake Almond, Harriet Bryant, Adam Lambert and Ammarah Pandor representing Sport related degree courses.



Every aspect of the visit proved to be a huge success, with all volunteers thrilled by seeing the increase in the children's skills and confidence as well as with advances in their own learning and world view.

Week 1 saw students from both universities deliver the highly acclaimed 'Cycling for Success' programme at Mnyakanya High School. Now in its third year the programme teaches students how to ride and maintain bikes. This skill is often life changing for the students, as many live as far as 2 hours away from the school which creates a barrier to their education. This year, as a result of the project 35 children learnt to ride bikes, 6 children trained as bike mechanics and 20 bikes plus spare parts and tools were shipped to the school for continued use by the students. The cycling programme was made possible with funding from the North Yorkshire based, Rob Stephenson Trust and shipping by Cardinal Maritime.

In Week 2 students delivered the Leadership through Sport programme as well as additional curriculum lessons and sports activities to children from four primary schools in the Eshowe area: Gratton, Holy Childhood, John Wesley and Little Flower. This proved to be a remarkable success with no less than 175 children gaining the award.

The sports equipment that had been used to deliver the course, again generously provided by the Rob Stephenson Trust, was donated to the participating primary schools to facilitate ongoing sports development and sports leadership activities.



Alongside these projects, eight Leeds Trinity Primary Education students spent time in two South African schools as part of their 'alternative placement' module. Week 1 saw the students work across grades four to seven in Ntolwane Primary School in Nkandla, with class sizes averaging around 70 to 100 pupils. A range of subject areas were covered, including Geography, Maths, Physical Education and English. In Week 2, the students were then allocated a specific grade to teach at John Wesley Primary School in Eshowe, presenting an opportunity to work alongside local teaching staff, and to learn more about the country's education system and culture. They had the opportunity to develop lessons based on the South African curriculum and were able to link this with football related resources such as the 'Premier Skills' (developed by the British Council in partnership with the Premier League) on topics such as 'Healthy Eating'.

Moses Xulu, a teacher from Ntolwane Primary School, highlighted the benefits for all involved:

The student teachers and leaders made a fantastic contribution in the classrooms, in sports and with the marvellous Festivals. Both learners and educators benefit from this exposure; the talents of all involved are nurtured by the experience. My students from all grades told me that they have benefited in so many ways not least by experiencing friendship, sharing and love."

Alan Stuart, Principal of the John Wesley School, praised the impact of the programmes:

...you have made an incredible impact on the lives of so many youngsters of Eshowe. Your efforts could be described as tireless, positive, enthusiastic, meticulously planned, generous and highly professional. We look forward to similar interactions in the coming years."



Mrs Pk Zondi, Bambisanani Coordinator at Mnyakanya:

It is difficult to think of suitable words to explain the importance of this partnership. Our learners lives really changed and will never be like before. They learnt so much about leadership skills in different sports and about riding and maintaining bikes. Our learners have gained confidence in leading their peers in different school activities. They have become very helpful in the community when it comes to fixing of bikes. The young people from both countries developed their leadership skills together; in this partnership everyone gains. The partnership brings so much to our school, our community and to our country."

Students from Mnyakanya also valued the experience:

We learnt a lot of things from our UK friends. We learnt many sports games like hockey, rounders, rugby and tennis; we also learnt how to ride and fix the bikes. I am so excited about what we learnt from the UK students this year. I am very proud that I can now play different types of sports that I have previously only seen on a television. I can now also fix bikes for myself and for my friends."

We learnt a lot of things from our UK friends. We learnt many sports games like hockey, rounders, rugby and tennis; we also learnt how to ride and fix the bikes. This was all a wonderful experience because we are now able to help anyone who has a problem with his or her bike even in the community."

Philasande Buthelezi:

We miss all the students from Leeds so much! They taught us many leadership skills such as communicating, active listening and how to train others in different aspects of life. We learnt the skills and rules of using the bikes. Everything was amazing!"

Magwaza Sakhile:

Our visitors from St. Mary's and the two Leeds universities were so kind, funny and patient with us. We were like brothers and sisters when we were together. We learnt so much from their discipline and about the importance of listening to others. I never thought that one day I would be able to ride and fix the bike, but today I'm proud that I have all those skills. I wish to thank the Bambisanani Partnership for changing my life."

It's been such a privilege to have this experience and work alongside some amazing schools, teachers and students." Georgia Gould:

the ability to achieve more than I thought I could. I have learnt that I am more adaptable and flexible than I thought."

Mia Bogush summed up her experience saving:

II have honestly had the best two weeks of my life! I have loved being able to teach and meet such amazing children who are so grateful for their education. I have learnt so much about South Africa as a country but also about myself. What I have learnt will stick with me forever and I can't wait to share the information with others and hopefully inspire them to go and make a difference by international volunteering. I can't wait to get back into a UK classroom and share the skills I have learnt!'d for my friends."

University of Leeds lecturer and Bambisanani trustee Andrew Lockwood:

We work with hundreds of South African students with the aim of raising aspirations through leadership and activity. It is a student led project and once in a lifetime adventure, where the students gain a range of skills and experiences which set them apart for life after university. The programme not only helps the South African students to develop new skills, but it also increases our students' skills. This year, over the course of the project, our students demonstrated an average improvement of 31% in 18 key employability skills. This will help them to stand out from the crowd once they leave university, making them attractive to top employers. Not only this, it is an experience they will never forget."

# Bambisanani Partnership and Rotary Club of Aireborough help transform teaching and learning in rural South African school

The Bambisanani Partnership

T. Mary's School, Menston and Mnyakanya High School in KwaZulu-Natal started the Bambisanani Partnership thirteen years ago and throughout that time the Rotary Club of Aireborough have supported the now charity that operates in one of South Africa's most deprived rural areas.

The local Zulu community had identified a pressing need to bring computers and the internet to the school in order to transform the education at the remote rural school of Mnyakanya which is situated in an area of extreme poverty and depravation. Three years ago, working with the KZN Department of Education, the partnership discussed an ambitious plan to create a computer based classroom (Media Centre) at the school. Following extensive research and consultation, long term Bambisanani supporter, Tony Moodley, Senior Advisor at the KZN Department of Education, produced a comprehensive three phase plan proposing a 'Computer Technology solution' at Mnyakanya.

Back in the UK Catherine Chattoe, Bambisanani Coordinator at St. Mary's began discussions with Bill Hudson, Graham Davies and Janet Kerr from Aireborough Rotary Club about the possibility of applying for a 'global grant' to implement Phase 1 of the plan from Rotary International based in the USA. The total estimated project cost was £30,000 with Aireborough Rotary Club committing to £10,000. Further liaison took place with Graham Chennells and Nick Phillips from Eshowe Rotary Club in South Africa who had also been long term supporters of the partnership. Eshowe Rotary Club consequently offered to support the project and Catherine, Graham and Janet began the rigorous process of the grant application. Late last year, following considerable hard work and commitment, the 'in principle' grant

for the remaining funds was approved by Rotary International. Over the last year the installation plan at Mnyakanya School has been put into place with the project managed by Nick Phillips supported with technical expertise from Eric Kruse.

Following three years of extraordinary international collaboration the Media Centre was opened at Mnyakanya High School this month. The purpose built classroom with enhanced security has full internet connectivity for twenty modern computers with associated software and additional hardware including projector and screen. The grant will also fund significant training for teaching staff together with technical support and connectivity fees for the next five years.

"This is a great achievement for The Bambisanani Partnership, Aireborough Rotary Club and Eshowe Rotary Club. Providing twenty computers and access to the internet will make such a difference to the students and teachers at Mnyakanya High School. The teachers will be able to use the facility to improve their teaching and students will be able to use the computers to aid their learning and access valuable information that may impact on their futures."



"We are pleased to have been able to facilitate the funding of this project which we know will have a massive positive impact on the lives of both the students and the teaching staff at the school. We are looking forward in conjunction with the Bambisanani Partnership to seeing how they have all progressed."

The Media Centre is known as 'Mary's Room' with respect to St. Mary's School and to Mary Jowett, former teacher and Deputy Head at Saltaire Secondary School, Bradford, who left a legacy to Aireborough Rotary Club which helped to fund the project. The Rotary District Governor in KZN Jaco Stander visited the school recently to officially open the new facility.

The opening of the Media Centre has already had a major impact on the teachers and students, many of whom walk two hours to and from school each day:

"We thank everybody concerned for the new Media Centre which will help transform our school for both learners and educators. We have already applied to the Department of Education to introduce Computer Application Technology as a subject across all grades to ensure that our learners are well equipped to face the real world and play their part in it."

"The New Media Centre is opening a new page of life for the Mnyakanya Community. It will make the life of educators and students easier. Students will start to learn how to use the computers as early as from grade 8 and will learn how to complete school work on them. This had been a big challenge for ages. This Media Centre will also help to train young people from the community how to apply online and search for employment opportunities without having to always travel to towns and cities to search for jobs.

## This will really change life for our community.

This Media Centre is marking the beginning of a computer literate society and an introduction of the importance of technology in our community. We as Mnyakanya School would like to pass our massive thanks to the Bambisanani Partnership and the Rotary Clubs of Aireborough and Eshowe."

Discussions are already underway at Mnyakanya School to use this initiative as a catalyst for further development that will further raise educational achievement. Priscilla Guliwe from the KZN Department of Education is recommending that the school is reclassified as a Technical School which will bring curriculum development and enhanced resources. Nick Phillips is also discussing the possibility of employing a specific Computer Application Technology teacher at the school as from January 2020.







## David Geldart – Improving health and education in South Africa and the UK through educational exchange



Over the past 14 years, David Geldart (M.Ed Physical Education 1989) has helped to change the lives of students in South Africa and the UK; he has established the Bambisanani Partnership, an educational exchange which uses sport to promote education, health, global citizenship and leadership.

The work of the Bambisanani Partnership covers a broad range of the UN Sustainable Development Goals, from Goal 1: No Poverty, through to Goal 17: Partnerships for the Goals. However, David's work has direct links to Goal 3: to ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages, and Goal 4: to ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning. He told us more about the work his charity is involved in, and how it is making a difference to the lives of those who take part.



#### How did you get involved in the work you're doing now?

In 2006 I founded the Bambisanani Partnership, which came about following an invitation from the South African government to develop a school-based sports project in the eighteen most deprived areas of South Africa. I began by establishing a link between my own school, St. Mary's High School in Leeds, and Mnyakanya High School, which serves one of KwaZulu-Natal's most deprived rural communities. We brought students together from the UK and South Africa in a collaboration that went on to inspire young people across many areas of the curriculum – not just sport – becoming embedded in the lives of both schools.

'Bambisanani' is a Zulu word meaning 'working hand in hand' and aptly describes the work and vision of this inspirational partnership that uses sport as a catalyst to promote education, health, global citizenship and leadership. One of our fundamental aims has been to create genuine 'two way' learning between students of both the UK and South Africa, with a key focus on 'working together and learning together'.

Fourteen years on, and this pioneering partnership has gained international acclaim for its work – we are now a multi-award winning charity. The project has not only been sustained, it has grown and expanded to involve other schools and indeed universities. Significantly, The University of Leeds and Leeds Trinity University are now both heavily involved in the partnership, and like St. Mary's School, students regularly visit South Africa in order to extend and develop the partnership's various programmes, such as 'Developing Leadership through Sport', 'Cycling for Success', and the use of sport to enhance other areas of the curriculum. .


Since its inception all those years ago, over 10,000 UK and South African students have now participated in Bambisanani activities. #### How did Leeds help you to get where you are today?

The University of Leeds was absolutely instrumental in giving me the academic basis, confidence and inspiration that fed my passion for education, sport and a better world. Alongside my work in schools, Leeds provided me with a range of opportunities at national and international level. Working with the brilliant Dr Jim Parry in both Physical Education and Philosophy was transformational. Jim challenged me in a way that I had not been challenged before – he made me think and taught me lessons that have continued to serve me and my work well for over thirty years. One thing tends to lead to another in life, and my current work with the Bambisanani Partnership can be traced back to my time at Leeds. I am therefore absolutely delighted that in recent years my alma mater has become a key member of the partnership, with students and staff regularly volunteering on our programmes in South Africa.



#### How is your role linked to sustainability?

I lead the Bambisanani Partnership Charity, which operates in one of South Africa's most deprived rural communities. It is committed to using sport to promote education, health, global citizenship and leadership – all key factors in creating a more sustainable world. Significantly, we bring young people together from both South Africa and the UK in a way that opens their eyes to a wider world and mutual learning possibilities. Challenged and inspired by the experience, young people from both counties begin to take a wider view of the world. They start to question the way the world is, and consider how it could, and indeed should, be in the future. Full of vision, hope and future intentions, these young people are better positioned to take their place in the world. This is real education.

#### What does sustainability mean to you?

For me sustainability is about taking care of the planet and its people; creating a more equitable, compassionate and harmonious world that is increasingly interdependent. It is about addressing human behaviour that is capable of destroying our world and each other; it is about inspiring and motivating behaviour that can do the reverse.

My holistic view encompasses and interrelates the social, environmental, economic and governance pillars of sustainability. I wholeheartedly support the UN Sustainable Development Goals, but view them as inextricably linked rather than in isolation. Indeed, while my work with the Bambisanani Partnership most obviously contributes to goals 3 and 4, I also believe that we make contributions to 1,2,5,8,10,16 and 17 in our own small and hopefully interconnected way.

Sustainability is about the kind of world I want to see, and what I am prepared to do to help achieve it through my own personal actions, advocacy and the opportunities I create for others to be motivated into action.

#### Why is it important?

Sustainability is important because time is running out. We all have a responsibility for the future of our planet and for humanity. There is clearly a mismatch between the kind of world that we would like to see and the one we have now. Sustainability in all its facets cannot afford to be 'everyone's concern but someone else's responsibility'. Change needs to happen; our leaders need to lead, but I believe that the most powerful and significant changes will have to come from individuals believing that their actions will make a difference.

#### What sort of actions do you think individuals need to take in the next five years to create a sustainable future?

Paradigm shifts in attitudes and behaviour will be required, but relatively small changes made by all of us would make the difference. If you want to see a kinder, more thoughtful and compassionate world, then be a kinder, more thoughtful and compassionate person. In all things we need to be empowered to be the change that we want to see in the world.

It is both ironic and perverse to think that there may be 'positives' that come from the Coronavirus pandemic, but I have been heartened and inspired by the outpouring of humanity during such a devastating and difficult time. Our lives suddenly became very different to what they had been, and I believe that because of this there is the very real potential for people around the world to 'press the reset button' in terms of purpose, values and what is really important in the world and in our lives. For many of us, I believe our priorities in the future will be different.

Every day we make choices about how we live our lives; what we consume and how we treat others. Every day presents us with a myriad of opportunities to make a real difference and a chance to live more authentic and meaningful lives – let's get going!

## From Menston to Mnyakanya: school fundraises for vital water

FOURTEEN years ago, Mnyakanya High School in rural KwaZulu-Natal in South Africa, together with St Mary's School, Menston, established the now multi award winning Bambisanani Partnership which uses sport to promote education, health, global citizenship and leadership. A few weeks ago Mnyakanya
School contacted the Bambisanani
Partnership charity with the
terrible news that they had no
water supply which meant that the
school could not reopen safely
after the coronavirus lockdown of

schools in South Africa, as basic hygiene requirements such as hand washing could not be carried out.

The Acting Principal of the school, Mrs Thulie Mkhize, spoke of young people 'starting to lose hope' in a school that offers hope above all else in one of the country's most remote and deprived areas.

In order to get running water reinstated at the school, students and staff from St Marys have started a fundraising campaign which involves members of the

school community collectively running, walking or cycling the equivalent distance from Menston to Mnyakanya – 8,709 miles! Led by teacher Miss Charlotte Wood, the initial challenge

Last weekend, a 10k run, cycle or walk event was completed by all the team which also saw many more teachers from the school join the challenge including: Mr Hearle, Mrs Hayes, Mrs Rix, Mr Pringle, Mrs Wilson, Miss Chrispin, Mrs Beesting, Miss Anderson, Mrs Thornton, Miss Rogers, Mrs Thomas, Mrs Findlay, Mrs Harrison, Ms Pettifer, Mr Dennett, Mr Steingold, Mrs Hanson, Mr Thornton, Miss Mason and Mrs Doyle. 

THE tragic death of former St Mary's School, Menston, student Jordan Sinnott last January touched the heart of the nation and indeed beyond. Jordan, a footballer who played for Huddersfield Town among other clubs, had always been a great supporter of the Menston-based Bambisanani Partnership. This month two specially

campaign not only received shirts from every football league club in the country but it went on to receive over 850 sports shirts from more than 30 countries from around the world.

More than 100 of these shirts will be going out to South Africa when Bambisanani volunteers from St Mary's visit next summer (Covid permitting). David Geldart, founder and chair of the partnership, had worked very closely with Jordan at St Mary's as he prepared to become a professional footballer and had remained in contact when he had left school.

David said: "Jordan was an amazing young man; a massive character with a heart of gold.

"Despite his phenomenal talent he was always modest and unassuming.

"He loved the Bambisanani Partnership and was a great supporter. "The awards in South Africa will encourage learners, year on year, to be the best that they can be. "With an award also to be introduced

## Cycling to Success in South Africa

The Bambisanani Partnership

bandoned bikes from the University of Leeds are enjoying a new lease of life in rural South Africa thanks to an ongoing project led by the universities sport development team and local charity, The Bambisanani Partnership. Over the last 4 years the bikes have found their way to Mnyakanya High School in Kwa-Zulu Natal to support the charities inspirational 'Cycle to Success' programme.



Each summer staff and students from the University of Leeds and Leeds Trinity University travel to South Africa to deliver a week of cycling based activities to pupils at the school. Travel to and from school in these remote areas can be challenging with some pupils walking two hours every day to access education. The University students and staff spend a week teaching pupils how to ride and maintain bikes - a commonplace skill in the UK but a life changing and mobilising one over in this part of South Africa! The programme ultimately helps pupils develop confidence and skills which support them to remain in the education system as well as the mechanical skills needed to keep the bikes moving long term.

Through partnership work in the UK with university campus Sustainability and Security Services more than 20 bikes a year are refurbished and shipped to Mnyakanya along with new bikes acquired through University

and Bambisanani Partnership fundraising and spare parts and tools funded by the Rob Stephenson Trust. The generous support of Manchester based shipping giants, Cardinal Maritime means the bikes are transported free of charge. Many of the old bikes are damaged when they are acquired so university staff and students give up their time to repair them to make sure they are safe and functional when they arrive in the port in Durban. The university student volunteers receive sports leadership and cycling proficiency training in the UK before travelling to South Africa to teach children aged 12-15 how to ride the bikes in just one week.

30-35 South African pupils are supported to learn regardless of their starting point some have never sat on a bike before, whilst others progress quickly learning how to signal and ride safely on open roads. Pupils are also supplied with bikes parts such as inner tubes and brake cables and taught how to repair the bikes which inevitably break down more quickly on the dirt roads around the school. The bikes stay in a hub at the school, being loaned out to pupils to break down the barrier of transport to school where one exists. Additionally, students from Leeds and Mnyakanya also join together in a wide range of cultural activities with traditional singing, dancing and sports activities taking place after school each day.

For the past fourteen years the Yorkshire based charity, The Bambisanani Partnership has worked in one of South Africa's most deprived rural areas using sport as a catalyst to promote education, health, global citizenship and leadership.

The charity has gained international acclaim for its work and the university involvement has taken this to new heights, with the Mnyakanya bike hub and 'Cycle to Success' project being the brainchild of University of Leeds Professional Development Manager, Andrew Lockwood. Andrew was approached in 2015 by The Bambisanani Partnership to support the expansion of their work in South

Africa to involve staff and students from the University of Leeds. Andrew accompanied a group from the projects founding school, St Mary's in Menston on a fact-finding mission that year. Using his expertise and experience in the field of sport development, Andrew engaged with teachers and pupils to understand some of the challenges faced in accessing education and future employment and the idea of the bike hub was born.

Mrs Pk Zondi, Bambisanani Coordinator at Mnyakanya High School :

Cycling was not that familiar in our community until this initiative was introduced four years ago. Since then it has become part of the lives of many learners. During lockdown, when schools were closed, they were so excited to be using the bikes. I could not believe to see even the elder people in the community showing interest in cycling. Mnyakanya young cyclists inspired the elder, who in turn decided to fix and renew their old bikes that had never been used for years and years. Some of those old bikes were brought to these young cyclists to fix them. We do not have enough words to pass on our aratitude and thanks to the University of Leeds and Leeds Trinity University for changing the lives of our young

Community member Senzo Mdlalose added:

It is so amazing to see the interest of cycling growing like this our community. I volunteered in assisting these young people if they have some challenges in repairing their bikes. Cycling is help the young people not to involve themselves in doing bad things. I make sure that they follow the rules of Covid 19 while they are using and fixing the bikes. I so wish that this cycling project may grow stronger."

Mnyakanya students are in no doubt about the impact of this initiative:

I love cycling. Sometimes I compete with my friends in a distance of about 10 kilometers or more. Cycling has become my daily activity, especially if there is no school. Many people on the road show an exciting interest in our cycling activity. We hear people hooting their taxis and others clapping their hands to encourage our cycling competition. Many people stop and watch what we do. I would like to thank Leeds University and Leeds Trinity University for introducing cycling to us." – Asanda Gabela

I am so grateful that I can ride and fix my bicycle for myself. It is now easier for me when my parents send me to a place that is far from home because I use a bike to take that iourney. I can ride as many times as I can, even if the weather conditions are bad. The bikes also help me to get to school earlier and faster. When there are heavy rains my books and my school uniform are not getting too wet if I am riding a bike. It is so exciting that the bikes have changed our lives for better. May God bless The Bambisanani Partnership and the Leeds university teams for changing our lives." - Sakhile Magwaza

Parallel to the impact on the recipients of the bikes, the impression on the skills and values of the UK students is huge. Skills auditing before, during and after the intervention saw students develop 10 top graduate level skills by an average of 31% from start to completion. "I'm proud to say I helped teach 30 kids how to ride a bicycle in just a few days. I am however even prouder to say that a group of 30 kids have taught me more than I could have ever imagined. I discovered the perseverance the children had as well as the importance of Zulu culture in those same couple of days!" said Franki Darko, a University of Leeds student who visited Mnyakanya in 2018.

Despite an unscheduled pause in the project this year due to the Covid-19 pandemic both here in the UK and in South Africa, the legacy of the last four years continues. Since 2016:

- 70 used bikes have been refurbished and shipped to Mnyakanya High School with the support of University of Leeds Security & Sustainability and Cardinal Maritime
- 80 new bikes have also been purchased and shipped through student and staff fundraising and The Bambisanani Partnership
- Tools and consumables to the value of £10k have also been provided thanks to the support of The Rob Stephenson Trust and The Bambisanani Partnership
- Over 120 South African children have been supported to learn to ride and maintain bikes
- 59 University of Leeds and Leeds Trinity students and staff have been involved in the project

Andrew Lockwood, who is now a Trustee of The Bambisanani Partnership said: "Setting up the bike hub at Mnyakanya has been hugely beneficial to all involved, not only the recipients of the bikes, but also the University staff and students who are able to develop outstanding professional skills and personal values through this unique challenge. The hub is now clearly embedded at Mnyakanya and in the surrounding community and we now hope to expand the project to further rural schools in the area over the next few years".

The Cycling to Success programme has gained praise from cycling organizations in both South Africa and the UK. One of Great Britain's greatest ever cyclists, Olympic gold medalist, Chris Boardman has recently said of the project: "This is a great initiative of which you should be very proud."





